ESOG's 33rd Annual Conference Concludes Successfully at Hilton Hotel with Prestigious Awards and Scientific Advancements



The 33rd Annual Conference of the Ethiopian Society of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ESOG) successfully concluded on March 11, 2025, at Hilton Hotel in Addis Ababa, following two days of insightful discussions, scientific presentations, and professional networking. The conference brought together national and international stakeholders, including policymakers, researchers, healthcare professionals, and industry leaders, under the theme "Every Woman, Every Newborn for a Healthy Future: The Role of ESOG." The opening day was graced by the presence of Her Excellency Dr. Mekdes Daba, Minister of Health, whose keynote address emphasized the government's commitment to improving maternal and newborn health in Ethiopia. Dr. Hailemariam Segni, President of ESOG, welcomed participants and highlighted the Society's achievements in advancing reproductive health, while Professor Anne Kihara, President of the International Federation of Gynecology and Obstetrics (FIGO), commended ESOG for its leadership in strengthening obstetric and gynecological care in the country.

Integrated RMNCH + PPFP Scale Up in High Caseload Facilities Project Regional Inception Meeting Conducted



The Integrated Reproductive, Maternal, Newborn, and Child Health (RMNCH) + Postpartum Family Planning (PPFP) Scale-Up Project has been conducted regional inception meeting. The initiative aims to enhance maternal and newborn health services across key regions in Ethiopia, reinforcing the country's commitment to reducing maternal and neonatal mortality rates.

The consortium running the project has conducted a series of regional inception workshops to engage key stakeholders, harmonize project priorities with government initiatives, and strengthen collaboration for effective implementation. These workshops served as a platform to discuss strategic interventions, clarify deliverables, and ensure a coordinated effort in scaling up RMNCH and PPFP services at high-caseload health facilities.

Through this project, ESOG and its partners will work to expand access to quality reproductive health services, build the capacity of healthcare providers, and support evidencebased policy implementation. The initiative reflects a shared commitment to reaching every woman and newborn with life-saving care, ensuring a healthier future for Ethiopia. Funded by the Gates Foundation, the four-year project (2024-2028) will be implemented in six regions: Oromia, Amhara, Central Ethiopia, Sidama, South Ethiopia, and Addis Ababa. The project is administered by consortium led by Engender Health, and including the Ethiopian Midwives Association (EMwA), the Ethiopian Society of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ESOG), the Ethiopian Pediatrics Society (EPS), and SPMMC. Population Council and MERQ will serve as evaluation partners to ensure the initiative's impact is effectively measured.

The primary objective of the project is to scale up postpartum and immediate postpartum family planning services (IPPFP and PAFP) within high caseload health facilities. This will be achieved through facility-level and community-level interventions, including competency-based training for healthcare providers, integration of gender, youth, and social inclusion (GYSI) approaches, and improved availability of reproductive health commodities. The project also aims to enhance the continuum of care by strengthening RMNCH-N service delivery systems in these high caseload settings.

A crucial component of the project is the introduction and scale-up of Hormonal Intra Uterine Device (HIUDs) as part of an expanded contraceptive method mix. Additionally, the initiative will focus on improving newborn care through the implementation of Kangaroo Mother Care (KMC) and strengthening the quality of antenatal, delivery, and postnatal care services. The project will also support the national rollout of the E-MOTIVE postpartum hemorrhage (PPH) bundle of care across health facilities, providing essential training and equipment for emergency obstetric care. The project will be implemented in phases, beginning with 300 high caseload health facilities in the five regions and one city Administration on the first phase of the two year and 600 facilities on low caseload facilities in the second phase of two year. The selection of these facilities is based on service demand, geographical distribution, and potential for integration with existing health programs. Special attention will be given to facilities in conflict-affected areas to ensure equitable healthcare access.

To maximize impact, the project will tackle critical barriers such as healthcare worker competency gaps, supply chain disruptions, poor integration of family planning and RMNCH services, and pervasive gender inequalities. Collaboration with government agencies and other stakeholders will be a priority to align interventions with national health strategies and ensure sustainability beyond the project's duration.

The inception meetings conducted across all project implementation regions mark a significant step forward in strengthening Ethiopia's healthcare system, particularly in reproductive, maternal, and newborn health. Through targeted interventions and strategic partnerships, the project aims to create a lasting impact by ensuring that more women and newborns receive the lifesaving care they need.
